










## MEGAN PETTY'S MISSIONARY JOURNEY

There were a lot of late nights and long conversations as counselors and interns tried to process, grieve, and still cling to hope. What gave me Hope, was seeing everyone show up, stay present, and continue together as a community to carry on what Libby and Jessica loved so much.

Next week is Homecoming, an event where past and present campers, counselors, staff, and volunteers reunite. It was the very first event I attended at Camp. At the time, I hadn't moved onto campus yet and was still living with my friend Brandie Lee about 50 minutes east. I remember crying almost the whole drive to Homecoming. I still didn't know where I was. I was surrounded by deer, and facing the unknown of walking into such a big new community was daunting. Of course, the event turned out to be wonderful and I met so many kind people, many I now hang out with regularly outside of Camp. There were still a few teary-eyed drives in those early months as I transitioned out of a decade at The Happy Place and into this brand-new season of "firsts."

Looking back, I can't speak highly enough about the staff (and campers!) who have been patient, kind, and affirming throughout this past year. It hasn't been perfect, but I trust the direction we're headed, and I'm grateful to say I plan on staying on staff here for a while longer.
